Having been aware of Madison Meadow for many years, Tom followed the events from the bid to develop co-housing to the current effort to purchase the Meadow as open space. Then one morning, after dreaming about Madison Meadow, Tom woke up with a strong urge to get involved.

He called members of the Board, started coming to meetings and asking questions. A member of the Board of Directors since June, Tom has spent 20-30 hours per week on fundraising efforts and securing loans during the summer and fall of 2007. His wife, Jane, and daughter, Eva, were responsible for making the Madison Meadow Fairies.

"Density is going to happen. Preserving open natural space in the core of the city is forward thinking and will be greatly appreciated in the future. There are very few spaces like Madison Meadow left", Tom said. Asked how open spaces like Madison Meadow are different from parks, Tom replied, "They serve as a habitat for wildlife – both plants and animals. They invite our children to use their imagination to explore and play creatively. I have spent a lot of time in the meadow and have come to really appreciate the wonder of it."
